

A visit to Hardy's Cottage

whilst he was sleeping, but thankfully he was unhurt.



'You are human once' Meet Simon Ndubai, a very special visitor to Stonebarrow

It was a ludicrously hot day during the June heatwave when out of the bright sunshine an outburst of words came fizzing onto our remote countryside site.

"It was just like I was walking! I could travel without any stress", Simon exclaimed about his first dizzy experience of using a mobility tramper at Stonebarrow.

His excitement was mesmerising, and I wanted to hear more about his trip exploring nearby Chardown Hill and Cain's Folly, the clifftop overlooking Charmouth and along the bay to Lyme Regis. As part of the team of Welcome and Service Assistants, we hire the tramper out on a daily basis to increasing numbers of visitors; it proves to be a memorable - and sometimes profoundly moving - experience for many people, who are often happily overwhelmed by the freedom it gives them to explore the countryside, local wildlife and even the weather, without any constraints - other than the 4mph top speed the tramper is limited to!

From his home in Kenya via a UN conference on disability rights in New York to Stonebarrow in West Dorset, Simon Ndubai certainly took the road less travelled to visit this National Trust site. Invited to the UK by his lifelong friends, Robin and Sue Carter - who he has known for over 50 years since Robin, a medical doctor, treated him in hospital in Kenya – this was Simon's first visit to Stonebarrow. It proved to be an unforgettable one, too.

"I volunteer for a Kenyan organisation called Federation of and for People with Disabilities" said Simon. "In Kenya" he continues "I could not do what I have just done today. I could not go out for a walk and be amongst nature unaided. We don't have facilities such as the tramper provided by any organisation for such a small fee, as the National Trust provides."

Simon had polio as a child, consequently experiencing a number of falls, and today is assisted in his walking by a pair of crutches. "When you're out in nature, you relax – and relaxation is very important to human beings. It brings so many benefits – just like going on holiday! It also increases awareness amongst non-

disabled people of our need to have these experiences and share these spaces. In this world, it's important that nobody is left behind – we should all be together. You are human once."

From the Archives - Extract from Newsletter No. 3 - January 1979

On the top of Golden Cap is a memorial (see cover photo) to the 13th Earl of Antrim, chairman of the National Trust from 1966 until his death in 1977. He was instrumental in the development of the 'Enterprise Neptune' appeal campaign in 1965, when plans were made to purchase and protect unspoiled coastline by the National Trust prior to the arrival of developers.

The Antrim Memorial Stone on Golden Cap

A great deal of thinking, planning and research had been going on for a long time, but as far as Golden Cap was concerned it all culminated on September 5th 1978 when the three ton stone that was to be Lord Antrim's memorial was brought to its site on the west end of the top of the Cap. Even helicopters had been considered as a means of lifting it up to the top! In the end, Mr Jackson, House of Blandford, who 'specialises in the impossible', brought it in a giant bulldozer. A huge swath had been cut in the bracken and heather; slowly and confidently the great machine crawled up the slopes from Filcombe to the steep crown of the Cap and inched its way up the swath, the lip of the bucket with the great stone chained in it, only just clearing the rising ground. The 'impossible' was accomplished when that huge monster turned round in its own length and lowered the stone as lightly as a dropped pea plumb into its base. The chains were pulled out through the mysterious channel left in the foundations and the stone sat comfortably as if it had grown there.

It has been chosen from Mr Hayson's quarry at Worth Matravers; it is rugged with an exciting impression of a very big ammonite at the top. The inscription had been beautifully cut in Westmorland Slate by Mr Harvey of Bridport, and the plaque was fitted perfectly into its slot.

On the 14th September the memorial stone was unveiled by Lady Antrim. It was covered with Tom Burr's counterpane with the Antrim flag bound round it, and it was surrounded by a large body of family and friends. Lord Gibson made a speech that was so just right and moving that even an outsider like myself felt a bit lumpy-throated. Lady Antrim pulled the string and the flag fell and the counterpane was helped with a hitch or two over the top and that was it.

Then there was a private luncheon in a marquee down at St Gabriel's. There is no flat ground at St Gabriel's so the matting on the floor was apt to roll downhill and somebody's plate skidded off the end of the sloping table!
